We will explore how language is used by the individual, focusing on regional diversity and a range of language frameworks such as: Grammar Phonetics Semantics Pragmatics Study also extends to explore language varieties, investigating how language is shaped depending on: Gender Social group Occupation We also study other areas of English including: Child Language Acquisition World English Language Change	A-Level English Language: Students sit 2 exams at the end of the course that assess skills developed throughout the year. In addition to this, students also produce a coursework portfolio that makes up 20% of the final grade. This will be based on a personal language investigation and a creative writing piece of their choice.	English GCSE Grade 5 or higher
	A-Level English Literature: The course requires critical thinking, wider reading to grasp social and historical contexts and an appreciation of how genres and their qualities are not fixed and therefore open to multiple interpretations. In year 12 we will be studying social protest writing which will include: The Kite Runner (Khaled Hosseini) The Handmaid's Tale (Margaret Atwood) Songs of Innocence and Experience (William Blake) Unseen prose extracts In Year 13 we will be studying the genre of tragedy: Othello (Shakespeare) A selection of poems by John Keats Death of a Salesman (Arthur Miller)	A-Level English Literature: At A2, students sit 2 exams and also produce two pieces of coursework which makes up 20% of the final grade. This will involve an essay and a piece of recreative writing.

A-Level English Language:

Analysis of various texts - everything from a poem to a crisp packet.

Dialects - how people from different places speak. - Language and gender - how gender affects language. - Language and occupations - how your job affects your language.

Child language acquisition - how children learn to talk and write.

Language change - how English has changed over time. Coursework - a research project and some creative writing.

A-Level English Literature:

Tragedy - Shakespeare, Tess of d'Urbervilles, Death of a Salesman.

Social and Political Protest - Shakespeare, Blake, Kite Runner, Unseen texts

Coursework - two essays, one on prose and one on poetry

A-Level English Language:

At the end of year 13 you will take two papers. You will also be required to complete two pieces of coursework.

A-Level English Literature:

At the end of year 13 you will take two papers. You do two coursework essays.
