Students in years 8,9,10,11 are to go to their tutor room upon arrival. Please note: there will be no break on this day for these year groups due to the late start

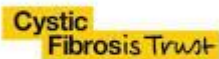
The full school calendar outlining the events of the year including parents' evenings, term dates and whole school activities will be available on the school website from September.

# A new chapter

Today, Literacy Leaders at Ingleby Manor Free School and Sixth Form, in Ingleby Barwick, explain what it's like to make the step up to secondary education.

## Punctuality

It is vital that students arrive to school on time ready to start their first lesson at 8.30am. Students are expected to on site by 8.25am and the school gates will be closed at this time. Any students arriving after 8.25am will be required to go to the main reception where their late arrival will be recorded.

Arriving late at school can be very disruptive not only for the child entering the classroom late but also for the teacher and other students who have already commenced the lesson.

Arriving 10 minutes late on a morning may not seem significant, however if a student arrives 10 minutes late each morning, over the course of the year they will lose 18 hours of teaching.

## Detentions

From September, there will be a change in how detentions will run in school.

Students who are issued a 30 minute detention and fail to attend will receive a 1 hour detention with a member of the Senior Staff. A blue sticker will be placed in the student's planner to give parents notification 24 hours prior to this taking place.

## uniform

At Ingleby Manor Free School, we expect every student to achieve the highest standards. High standards of personal presentation and correct wearing of uniform is essential and can make a significant contribution to our ethos of mutual respect throughout the school. As a school, we have strict guidelines around school uniform and what is deemed acceptable. To help with this, we have outlined the uniform requirements below.

## **PE Kit**

- School colours sports shirt
- Plain navy sports socks
- School colours shorts or skort
- Training shoes or sports boots
- Plain navy tracksuit bottoms School colours tracksuit bottoms (no sports logos)
- School colours hoodie (optional)

Students wearing clothing associated with religious belief should, where possible, adhere to the school's colour scheme.

## **Jewellery and Hairstyles**

Our aim is to establish a culture of respect and hard work and as such we plan to remove avoidable distractions with the following guidelines:

- Earrings are NOT permitted
- No personal jewellery is to be worn other than a wristwatch.
- There should be no body art or body piercings visible.
- Extremes of hair fashions and shaved heads (Buzz cuts) are not permitted.

## **Mobile Phones**

Students are responsible for their own property whilst in school.

For students that bring Mobile phones to school, they must have them turned off and stored either in their bag or locker for the duration of the school day.

Students found using mobile phones in school will have them confiscated and a parent will be contacted to collect them.

## **Personal Belongings**

Any personal items brought into school including mobile phones, bikes, and designer items are the responsibility of the student. Items must be stored and secured appropriately whilst in school.

The school do not take responsibility for any items that are lost, damaged or stolen.
